#### Liturgy of the Word

First Reading
A Reading from the Book of Second Chronicles.
(2 Chronicles 36:11-12, 14-21 (CCL))

Zedekiah was 21 years old when he became King of Jerusalem. He did what was evil in God's eyes. He also refused to humble himself before Jeremiah, the prophet who spoke God's word. All the priests and leaders of the people became more and more unfaithful, adding treachery to treachery, following detestable practices, defiling the House of God, the Temple, which had been consecrated in Jerusalem.

The Holy One, the God of their ancestors, sent word to them through messengers again and again. God had compassion for the people and for God's own dwelling place, the Temple. But they mocked God's messengers, despised their words, and scoffed at the prophets until God's anger blazed up, beyond remedy.

God brought up against them the Babylonian, Nebuchadnezzar. This ruler killed their young people with the sword, in their own sanctuary, and spared neither young men nor young women, neither the elderly nor the infirm. God gave all of them into the hands of Nebuchadnezzar.

All the sacred vessels from the House of God, large and small, the treasures of the House of God, and the treasures of the King and his Officials - all of these, Nebuchadnezzar brought to Babylon. They burnt the House of God, tore down the walls of Jerusalem, burnt down all its palaces and destroyed all its precious objects.

Those who escaped the sword, Nebuchadnezzar carried captive to Babylon. They became servants to him and his children until the Persian kingdom came to power. All this was to fulfill the word of God spoken by Jeremiah: "The land will lie desolate until it has retrieved its lost Sabbaths. It shall enjoy rest for seventy years."

As Jesus and the disciples were leaving Bethany, on their way up to Jerusalem, Jesus felt hungry. Seeing a fig tree some distance away, he went to see if he could find fruit on it, but when he reached it he found nothing but leaves, for it was not the season for figs.

#### Gospel

So, Jesus spoke to the tree: "May no one ever eat your fruit again." The disciples heard this. Then they reached Jerusalem. Jesus entered the temple and began to drive out the sellers and the buyers in the temple. He upset the tables of the money changers and the seats of those who were selling doves.

Jesus prevented anyone from carrying goods through the temple. At the same time, he taught them: "Doesn't Scripture say, 'My house will be called a house of prayer for all peoples'? You have turned it into 'a den of thieves."

News of this made it to the chief priests and the scribes. They kept looking for a way to kill him, but they were afraid of him because the crowds were amazed by his teaching. When evening came, Jesus left Jerusalem. The next morning, as they passed by the fig tree, they saw it withered to its roots. Peter remembered. "Look, Rabbi!" he said, "the fig tree you cursed has withered!"

Celebrant: My friends, this is the good news from the Gospel of Mark.
