First Reading
A Reading from the Book of Sirach.
(Sirach 3:17-18,20-22,28-29 (CCL))

Lector: A reading from the Wisdom of Sirach.

My child, carry out your business with humility, and you will be better loved than a lavish giver. The greater you are, the humbler you must be, and you will find favor with God.

For great is the power of God, but it is by the humble that God is glorified. Do not seek out things that are beyond your scope. Do not scrutinize things that are beyond your power.

Whatever gifts are committed to your care, attend to them. Neither worry about, nor meddle in, what is not yours, what you cannot control.

For the disease of the proud, there is no cure, like the off-shoot of a poisoning root. A sensible person will take a proverb to heart - the ear that listens to Wisdom rejoices.

Second Reading A Reading from the Letter of James. (James 2:1-9,14-17 (CCL))

Lector: A reading from the Letter of James.

Beloved, Show no favoritism as you adhere to your faith in Christ Jesus, the One who now shares in God's glory.

Suppose a person with gold rings and fine clothes comes into your assembly; and a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in. If you take special notice of the well-dressed person, and say, "Come this way to the best seats," then tell the one who is poor, "Stand over there," or, "You can sit on the floor by my footstool", by making this distinction among yourselves, have you not become judges using a corrupt standard?


Listen, Beloved: Has not God chosen those who are poor in the eyes of the world to be rich in faith and to inherit the reign of God promised to those who love God? But you dishonored the poor person. Are not the rich exploiting you? Are they not hauling you off to court? Are they not blaspheming the noble name of the One to whom you belong? If you really keep the royal law found in Scripture, "Love your neighbor as yourself," you are doing well. But if you show partiality, you break the law.

What good is it, beloved, if someone claims to have faith but has no works? Can such faith save them? Suppose one of you is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace. Keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith, without good works, is quite dead.

Gospel (cont.)

Noticing how the guests sought the places of honor at the table, Jesus told them a parable: "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor. Someone more distinguished than you may have been invited by your host. The host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place.' Then, in disgrace, you would be moved to the lowest place. Rather, when you are invited, sit down at the place of lowest rank, so that your host may come and say to you, 'Friend, move up higher.' Then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. For all who exalt themselves will be humbled; and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

Jesus also said to his host: "When you are having guests for lunch or supper, do not invite your friends, your siblings, and other relatives. They might invite you in return, and then you would be repaid in full. Rather, when you give a banquet, invite those who are poor, those whom society has failed, those who are looked upon as outcasts, and those who are cast out. Then you will be blessed because they cannot repay you; you will be repaid at the resurrection of the just."

Celebrant: The Gospel of Jesus the Christ.

People Respond: Praise to you, Jesus the Christ.
