Liturgy of the Word

First Reading
A Reading from the Prophet Isaiah.
(Isaiah 53:1, 3-4, 6-9, 11-12 (CCL))

Lector: A reading from the Prophet Isaiah.

Who has believed what we have heard? To whom has divine strength been revealed? It was to the Servant who was despised, rejected by others, one of sorrows, one familiar with suffering. Truly this Servant has shared our affliction, and our pain.

We thought you were being punished, struck down by God, and brought low. All of us, like sheep, have gone astray from you. We have turned our own way. Though treated harshly, you bore it humbly. You never opened your mouth. Like a lamb being led to the slaughter, or a sheep before shearers, you were silent

By a perversion of justice, you were taken away. Who would ever have foreseen your destiny? You were taken from the land of the living, stricken in the name of peace. You were buried with those who had committed egregious crimes, though you had done no violence, and there was in you no deceit. Out of your anguish, you will see joy and light.

Knowledge of you, O Righteous One, will turn many to justice. Because you served all and allowed yourself to be counted with the least among us, you are among the great.

Responsorial Psalm (Spoken) (Psalm 62:6-13 (CCL))

Lector: We pour out our hearts to God.

Lector: My Soul, be at rest in God alone, from Whom comes my hope. You, O Love, alone are my source, my liberation, and my shelter. I shall never fall.

Lector: Love is my strength and my refuge. In You alone is freedom and honor. Trust in Love at all times, O People! Pour out your hearts to Love who is our sanctuary.

Lector: Humans are but a breath, the powerful, but an illusion. Set both on the scales together, they are lighter than a breath. Put no trust in extortion, as do many powerful rulers. Put no empty hope in robbery as do authorities who steal from the poor. Do not set your heart on wealth that increases.

Lector: One thing God has said, two things I have heard: "Strength belongs to God," "You are Unfailing Love, O God."

Second Reading A Reading from the Book of Romans. (Romans 15:1-8 (CCL))

Lector: A reading from the Book of Romans.

We who are mature in faith ought to understand and Be patient with the stumbling of those with a fledgling faith. Each of us should bring joy to our neighbors for their good, to build them up.

Jesus did not live for personal satisfaction but, as it is written: "The insults of those who insult you have fallen on me."

For everything in the Scriptures is written for our instruction. With endurance, and Scriptural encouragement, we have hope. May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to live with one another in harmony, in the spirit of Christ Jesus.

Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ Jesus has welcomed you. Do this for the glory of God. Jesus became a servant to his own, the Judean people, so as to confirm the truth of God's promises given to their ancestors. Jesus also became a servant to the Gentiles, so that all might glorify God; for God loves all.

Scripture reminds us that God has always welcomed all: "Rejoice, O Gentiles, with God's people". And again, Isaiah says, "The root of Jesse will sprout; a child will rise up and call forth all peoples. That one will come; and in this Expected One, the Gentiles shall hope."

May the God of hope fill you to overflowing with joy, fill you to overflowing with peace, so that your belief lives! Filled with the life-giving energy of the Holy Spirit, brim over with hope!

Gospel

A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke. (Luke 22:14-30 (CCL))

Celebrant: May the Word of Christ be with you all.

People Respond: And also, with

you.
Celebrant: A reading from the Good
News attributed to Luke.

People Respond: † Glory to you, O God.

When the hour came, Jesus and the apostles reclined at the table. Jesus said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. I will not eat it again until the Passover is fulfilled in the kingdom of God." Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks, said "Take this and share it with one another. From this moment, I will not drink of the fruit of the vine until God's reign comes."

Jesus took bread, and after giving thanks, broke it, and gave it to them, saying: "This is my body given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

In the same way, with the cup, after supper, Jesus said: "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, poured out for you. But, see, the hand of the one who is going to betray me is at this table with me. The Chosen One will go as it has been determined, but woe to the person by whom the Chosen One will be betrayed!"

They began to ask one another which of them it might be who would do this. Another dispute arose among them about which of them would be regarded as the greatest.

Jesus said to them, "Earthly rulers lord it over their people, and those who exercise authority are addressed as "Benefactors."

But this must not happen with you. No, the greatest among you should be like the least, and the leader like the one who serves. For who is the greater: the one who reclines at table or the one who serves? Surely it is the one reclining at the table?

But I am here among you as one who serves. You are among those who have stood by me in my trials. I confer on you, just as my God conferred on me, a kingdom, so that you may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom."

Celebrant: The Gospel of Jesus the Christ according to Luke.

People Respond: Praise to you, Jesus the Christ.
