Liturgy of the Word

A Reading from the Book of Genesis.

Yahweh God formed man out of the clay of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became a living soul.

Then Yahweh God planted a garden to the east, in Eden, and there he placed the man whom he had formed. Out of the ground, Yahweh God made every kind of tree to grow, that were delightful to look at and good for food. In the center of the garden was the Tree of Life and the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil.

Now the serpent was the most cunning of all the animals which Yahweh God had made. The serpent asked the woman: "Has God really told you not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?"

The woman answered the serpent: "We may eat of the fruit from all the other trees in the garden, but the fruit from the tree in the middle of the garden, God has Said — "You shall not eat it or even touch it, or you will die."

But the serpent said to the woman: "You certainly will not die! No, God knows well that the moment you eat of it, your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods who know what is good and what is evil."

When the woman saw that the tree was good for food and pleasing to the eyes, and that the tree was desirable for gaining wisdom, she took some of its fruit and ate it. She also gave some to the man who was with her, and he ate. Then the eyes of both of them were opened, and they realized that they were naked, and so they sewed fig leaves together and made loin-cloths for themselves.

A Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans.

Through the actions of the first humans, sin came into the world. And, through sin, death spread through the whole human race, because all have sinned. Sin existed in the world long before the Law of Moses was given. Even though sin, before the law, was not a matter of breaking the law, and even though it was not called sin before the Law, death still reigned from Adam to Moses because Adam himself was an image of the One who was and is to come.

But the gracious gift is not like the transgression. For, if by the transgression of one person's sin, the many had died, how much greater will God's grace and the gracious gift of one man, Christ Jesus, overflow for the many?

God's gift is not like the death caused by Adam - the one who sinned. Everyone was condemned to death because of his sin; but, despite many transgressions, God's gift of grace brought acquittal. If death ruled because of one person's offenses, how much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and gift of righteousness reign in life, through the One, Christ Jesus.

In conclusion, just as a single offense brought condemnation upon all, one righteous act brought acquittal, and life came to all. Just as through one person's disobedience, the many were judged sinners, so, through the obedience of the One, the many are made righteous.

Announcements — Looking Ahead

Holy Week Happenings - Week of April 2nd to 9th

- Palm Sunday, April 2nd, 10:30 a.m. Passion of Our Lord Blessing & Distribution of Palms. This Mass recalls Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem on his way to his passion and death. The Palm Sunday celebration marks the beginning of Holy Week.
- Holy Thursday, April 6th, 7:00 p.m. Mass of the Last Supper. This Mass recalls Jesus' institution of the Sacraments of Holy Eucharist and Holy Orders (priesthood) and when He gave us his greatest Commandment to love one another. The altar is stripped at the end of this Mass and remains bare until Easter.
- Good Friday, April 7th, 3:00 p.m. Prayer Service, Holy Communion. On Good Friday, there is no consecration of the Eucharist, but Holy Communion follows the Liturgy of the Word and Veneration of the Cross.
- Holy Saturday, April 8th, TBA Easter Vigil. Holy Saturday separates Good Friday from
 Easter Sunday and is the day we celebrate the vigil of Christ's followers held for Him outside
 of the tomb as we await the Resurrection. Vigil traditions include lighting the fire and blessing water and candles to symbolize Christ's passing from death to life. We toll the bells at
 the Gloria, signifying the joyous end of Lent.
- Easter Sunday, April 9th, Sunday Mass, 10:30 a.m. Celebration of the Resurrection of Christ!
